individuals and companies
have come together to
ensure the Rainbow Lake
Golf & Country Club
(RLGCC) is a vital and
active part of the Town of
Rainbow Lake's recreational
scene.

"Everybody does their part to help out. We're fortunate to have people here who have the funds, time and energy to put into things like this," said Jason Grant, President of the RLGCC.

Grant, who calls PEI home but has commuted to Rainbow Lake for 18 years, is in his third year with the club and loves being involved in initiatives that benefit his adoptive community.

The non-profit course provides a place for locals to exercise and enjoy themselves. It is also the host venue for the annual Rainbow Lake Oilmen's Association (RLOA) Golf Tournament, a fundraiser that provides revenue for the RLOA and other community organizations that need a boost such as the daycare, the children's centre, minor hockey league and more.

"We get a lot of players who come from out of town, so it's a boost to the community and to the golf course itself. It's a small town here. We all work together and play together," said Grant.

The course boasts nine holes through gorgeous but challenging treed terrain, and it's all maintained by six paid staff. Thanks to the steady membership numbers the leadership of Grant and eight other board members, the course is undergoing some much-needed upgrades. They will be updating the golf cart fleet this summer, and golfers can expect to see a re-designed green.

"We were able to make significant changes to the golf course. It's come a long way in a few years, and I'm proud to be a part of that," said Grant. The club gives back to the community whenever possible, donating to community organizations and offering free golf programs to the schools. All of it is only possible because of the tremendous support the club receives from community members, businesses and organizations.

"I'm happy with the town over the last three years," said Grant. "We have a lot of new members and the membership base is good. We want to thank the community for helping us out and keeping the community alive."
